1. Introduction

In addition to 'business as usual' issues, we have been focusing on key deliverables, including:

- Membership
- Executing, reporting, and finalising CSIRO 'Circular Economy' projects
- Preparing, organising, and delivering MDA conference and AGM
- Working on financials
- Following up on previous motions and preparing motions for the AGM
- Advocacy

2. Membership

The Murray Darling Association is continuing to drive membership wherever possible and have conducted engagement and membership campaigns with current non-member Councils and Non-Local Government Entities whenever the opportunity allows. Recently, the MDA engaged in meetings with Local Government Areas in Region 7. Feedback has bben very positive, with a number of Mayors and Chief Executives indicating that they would consider re-joining the Association. We also received similar feedback from Queensland Councils after the MDA's presentation to the recent Council of Mayors meeting.

The Murray Darling Association is planning to conduct similar engagements and visits with Local Government Areas in its other regions.

3. Advocacy

The Murray Darling Association has continued to connect with related parties in the water space, both Federally and State based.

Of particular note, the Federal Minister for the Environment and Water, Hon Tanya Plibersek MP, spoke at our 78th National Conference, and there has been ongoing communication following. The MDA has had follow up calls and had very good discussions about many subjects, including MinCo and recurrent funding for the MDA as well as water buybacks.

The Minister very much enjoyed being at the MDA conference and enjoyed meeting many of our members from across the Basin. Minister Plibersek has indicated that her door is open to us and looks forward to further engagement such as through the Water Reform Taskforce and MinCo.

The Murray Darling Association has received much media attention following the 78th National Conference, as well as leading up to its 79th National Conference in September 2023. With this continuing, the MDA aims to capitalise where appropriate.

A number of speaking opportunities have ensued, with the MDA engaging with, and presenting at the Water Symposium and the SW Qld Council of Mayors.

The Murray Darling Association has also been approached to partake in the Department for Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water's (DCCEEW) "Delivering the Murray-Darling Basin Plan" workshop, and has been invited to provide feedback and recommendations to the Department on how to achieve the delivery of the Basin Plan. To this effect, the MDA engaged with its members, and has submitted its feedback report outlining 21 Recommendations to deliver the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

This Feedback report has also garnered interest from the Murray-Darling Basin Authority.

We are continuing to develop relationships with State Ministers and relevant bodies, and we are currently seeking face to face meetings to further the Association's advocacy goals.

4. Partnerships, collaboration, and engagement

We are continuing to work on a range of partnerships such as CSIRO, SQNNSW and One Basin CRC. Whilst the CSIRO relationship has already provided outcomes, other partnerships are a slower burn. However, feedback has been very positive in terms of the potential of these relationships.

5. CSIRO and the Circular Economy

CSIRO Land and Water has partnered with MDA to investigate and explore a series of strategic growth areas that align with the biggest land and water challenges faced by Australian governments/agencies, industries, and communities. These growth areas will build on capabilities and that of our partners and transform the boundaries of the types of products, research projects and services we might collaborate on.

They have identified Repurposing Waste / Circular Economy as a strategic growth area and we are interested in validating this with LGA's as a valued partner. We would like to understand more about how LGA's work within the repurposing waste / circular economy area within their organisation.

"The MDA had achieved in 3 months what would have taken CSIRO years." They are also keen to hear about any future aspirations they might have in regard to infrastructure solutions they need now and into the future. To capture these insights. We completed a series of meetings in May and June that will help inform the future of this growth area and ensure they can design solutions that are of value for all.

Having successfully completed all requirement and presented to the management of CSIRO, they indicated that they were very pleased with our work, stating that "the MDA had achieved in 3 months what would have taken CSIRO years." We have developed good working relationships with most of their departments – in particular, the Land and Water Division. Given the interest around managed aquifer recharge, there is potential to partner with CSIRO again re this area of work.

We have engaged with CSIRO on a further project, which is an extension of the previous Circular Economy work. There is the potential to conduct further work with CSIRO departments which we are continuing to explore.

In addition to the above projects, we are providing consultancy to an organisation that is working in the Circular Economy.
