



Positions prosecuted by the Murray Darling Association on behalf of members this year have delivered strong results, including contribution to the development of policy, review of legislation, including:

- Review of the Basin Plan to ensure balanced weighting of economic, social and environmental impacts
- Greater flexibility for the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder to facilitate investment in water efficiency infrastructure and initiatives.
- Price of temporary water and its trajectory over recent seasons is constraining agriculture and is unsustainable.
- Legislation to cap buybacks at 1,500 Gigalitres.
- Ensuring that the 2750GL of environmental water to be recovered under the plan can be efficiently, effectively and safely delivered, and can achieve the intended outcomes.

CONSTITUTION REVIEW

The current Constitution, while sound in its intent, has not kept pace with the requirements of the governing legislation, the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. Various drafts and amendments over the years have resulted in a number of inconsistencies that have tended to create confusion, and even divisions, Particularly regarding member's voting rights, and responsibilities.

In order to address these deficiencies, the board of the Murray Darling Association this year resolved to undertake a review the Constitution, to ensure good governance and compliance with our legal obligations.

The Murray Darling Association have partnered with Russell Kennedy Lawyers, though Andrew

Sherman to assist with this process. Andrew is a Law Institute Environmental, Planning & Local Government Law Accredited Specialist. Andrew has particular skills in Water Law. RK Lawyers is a valued partner and sponsor of the Murray Darling Association.

A revised draft of the Constitution will be circulated to all members later this year. The executive will undertake a comprehensive consultation process before circulating the final draft for approval prior to consideration for adoption at the 2016 AGM.

It is anticipated that changes will be minimal, with basic structures and principles remaining consistent with the intentions of the Associations forebears.

70TH ANNIVERSARY CONFERENCE AND AGM - FROM LITTLE THINGS, BIG THINGS GROW







MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN

Murray–Darling Basin Authority (MDBA)

and

Murray Darling Association Inc. (MDA)

The parties seek to establish a strategic alliance which will maximise their collective energies, engagement and influence for the overall benefit of the Murray-Darling Basin and the communities dependent on the basin's resources, via the implementation of the Basin Plan.

The parties recognise the importance of mutual cooperation, consultation and knowledg sharing, and through respect and commitment to their ongoing relationship have hereby reached the following understanding:

The Parties

The MDBA was established under the Commonwealth Water Act 2007 as an independent, expertise-based statutory agency. Its role includes edviaing a six-member Authority, of which the Chief Executive is a member, about Beain-wide strategy, policy and planning, MDBA undertakes activities that support the sustainable and integrated management of the water resources of the Numay-Daring Basin in a way that beat meets the social, economic and environmental needs of the basin and its communities.

The MDA was founded in 1944 as the Murray Valley Development League. It is an association of local government municipatities in New South Wafes, Queensland, South Australia, and Victoria, as well as community groups, businesses, individuals and agencies with an interest in ensuring that the Murray–Darling Basin continues as a visible and valuable asset for all Australians.

The MDA provides a focus for local government and community participation in the major natural resource issues of the Murray-Dadling Basin. It provides information, facilitates debate, identifies needs and priorities, undertakes projects and education initiatives, and promotes research. Since 1944, the MDA has contributed to a number of important initiatives. These include water conservation, decentralisation, tourism, the Snowy Scheme, catchment management, water quality, regional development, formation of the Murray-Darling Basin Ministerial Council, promotion of dry land a lanithy control measures and developed awareness and managed peet plants and animals.

The Nature of the Collaboration

Local povernment clearly plays a key role in the governance of the Murray–Darling Basin. The MDBA places a great importance on knowledge generation and access to that knowledge by its community partners so that effective water management decision making is supported. The MDBA thereby recognises the valuable role of the MDA in drawing on local government knowledge from across the basin and respects its insight, expertise and understanding of its more than 100 member local government councils and of the wider community membership throughout and beyond the Muray–Darling Basin. The importance of venting closely with the MDA will remain crucial as the MDBA continues to advance water reform activities in the basin.

Resourcing and Financial Arrangements This document is not intended to create biolog or legal obligations on either party. Nother party has any advorty to act on behalf of other parties unless specifically partied. Both parties shall ensure that there is a direct reporting line in their respective organisations to facilitate efficient and terrely information exchange.

Both parties agree to make available and cover any costs of such of their staff and resources, as they may separately find possible and appropriate, to work on and mutually benefit from the collaboration.

Intellectual Property Nothing in this Menocendum of Understanding amounts to a licence or transfer of any intellectual preperty or information disclosed. Each of the parties agrees to teep as commercial-in-confidence information disclosed by the other party on a confidential basis.

Both parties agree to consult each other and gain consult before publicly promoting any joint collaboration that may arise from this Memorandum of Understanding.

- the parties will mutually support and, where appropriate, promote info exchange between themselves, constituent members (local authoritie government agencies as appropriate. ities) and
- involve the MDA in the gathering and collection of data as it relates to the MOBA's monitoring and evaluation framework and reporting requirements dealing with social and economic impacts. The MDBA will consider resous implications of such work and will assist where appropriate.

The Murray Darling Association has a membership that includes of local government municipalities, individuals and businesses across the basin. Taking in areas along the Murray, Darling, Murrumbidgee and other rivers in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and South Australia as well as communities that rely on water from the Murray-Darling Basin, our members represent a large and varied area of Australia.

Member councils include some of Australia's richest irrigated and dryland farming land, producing billions of dollars worth of produce for local and export markets. Water from the Basin contributes to social and economic health and wellbeing well beyond its boundaries and the area is of considerable heritage, environmental, tourism and recreational significance. The basin footprint extends from central Queensland in the north, and south almost to Melbourne in the south. Spanning from the headwaters of the Snowy River in the east to Adelaide in the west, the Murray- Darling Basin incorporates 14% of the Australian continent.

The 12 regions of the basin are grouped according to communities of interest along river systems and wetlands, irrigation districts and by geographic distinction.

Regional boundaries are defined not by state border but by local government areas, reflecting our close connection with local government, communities and the people within them.


VALE

MURRAY DARLING ASSOCIATION INC NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009* and the *Associations Incorporation Regulation (NSW) 2010*. The Board has determined that the not-for-profit Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report covers Murray Darling Association Inc. as an individual entity. Murray Darling Association Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009 and the Associations Incorporation Regulation (NSW) 2010.

The financial report has been prepared on a going concen and accruals basis, and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is also the Association's functional currency.

a. Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax pursuant to Division 50, section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b. Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all Fixed Assets is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

c. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Board reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

d. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand and at banks.

e. Revenue

Membership, Grants, Project, Activities & Interest revenue are recognised when received.

Donations and bequests are recognised in accordance with Accounting Standard AASB 1004 (a) the entity gains control of the contribution or the right to receive the contribution; and (b) it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the contribution will flow to the entity; and (c) the amount of the contribution can be measured reliably.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

f. Employee Provisions

(i) Wages and Salaries

Liabilities for wages and salaries are recognised and measured as the amount unpaid at balance date and include appropriate on costs such as superannuation.

(ii) Annual Leave

Annual leave entitlements are accrued on a pro rata basis in respect of services provided by employees up to balance date and are measured at the amount expected to be paid, including appropriate on costs, when the accrued obligation is settled.

(iii) Long Service Leave

A liability for long service leave for permanent and casual employees is recognised. The liability for permanent employees is measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels including on costs, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using interest rates on national government guaranteed securities with terms to maturity that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

The liability for casual employees is measured as the amount expected to be paid, including appropriate on costs, when the accrued obligation is settled. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels including on costs, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

The amount relating to employees who have accrued ten or more years' service is recognised as a current liability in the Statement of Financial Position. All other amounts are recognised as a non-current liability.

g. Trade and Other Receivables

Contractual receivables includes accrued interest and other minor receivables. They are recognised at fair value.

h. Trade and Other Payables

Contractual payables arise when the association becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of goods and services. They are initially recognised at fair value, and then subsequently carried at amortised cost.

i. Leases

Leases of Fixed Assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases

Finance lease are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a diminishing value basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred

j. Murray Darling Foundation

The Murray Darling Foundation was established by the Murray Darling Association Inc. as a 'Gift Fund' to receive tax deductible donations. The principal activity of the Foundation is to support the objectives of the Murray Darling Association Inc. The Foundation may receive gifts of money or property which are eligible tax deductible donations under item 6.1.1 of sub-section 30-55(1) of the Income Tax Assessment 1997.


